Scenario 1: You are walking through a park and notice a group of sparrows pecking at some food scraps left by picnickers. As you approach, one of the sparrows seems injured and unable to fly. What should you do?

- A) Approach the injured sparrow slowly and try to pick it up to take it home.
- B) Ignore the injured sparrow and continue walking.
- C) Contact a local animal rescue organization for assistance.

Scenario 2: While walking to the bus stop, you come across a mother cat and her kittens huddled under a car. They seem scared and wary of strangers. What's the best course of action?

- A) Approach the kittens to pet them and see if they're friendly.
- B) Walk away and pretend you didn't see them.
- C) Leave some food and water nearby and notify a local animal shelter about the situation.

Scenario 3: While playing in the children's park, you notice a snake slithering near the swings area. You're unsure if it's venomous or not.

- A) Immediately inform a nearby adult or park authority about the snake.
- B) Try to catch the snake to show it to your friends.
- C) Slowly and quietly move away from the snake and inform other children to do the same.

Scenario 4: While cycling in the city, you spot a squirrel darting across the bike path in front of you. It suddenly stops in the middle of the path, unsure which way to go. What's the safest action to take?

- A) Swerve quickly to avoid hitting the squirrel.
- B) Slow down and give the squirrel time to move out of the way.
- C) Continue cycling at the same speed, hoping the squirrel moves in time.

Scenario 5: Walking through a park, you encounter a flock of ducks with ducklings. The adult ducks seem protective and start hissing as you approach. What's the best way to proceed?

- A) Approach the ducks slowly to admire the ducklings up close.
- B) Walk around the flock, giving them a wide berth.
- C) Make loud noises to scare the ducks away.

Scenario 6: You are walking through a crowded market area when you notice a stray cow wandering amidst the shoppers. It looks thin and hungry. What should you do?

- C) Inform local authorities or an animal welfare organization about the stray cow's presence.

Scenario 7: While playing in a neighbourhood park, you see a group of monkeys rummaging through the garbage bins. One of them looks aggressive and starts approaching you. What's the safest action to take?

- A) Run away quickly to avoid the monkey.
- B) Stay calm and slowly back away from the monkey without making direct eye contact.
- C) Approach the monkey and try to feed it to calm it down.

Scenario 8: Walking home from school, you encounter a stray dog lying injured on the side of the road. It's whimpering in pain. What's the most appropriate step to take?

- A) Try to move the dog to a safer place on your own.
- B) Leave the dog and continue walking on your way.
- C) Immediately inform an adult or animal rescue organization for assistance.


Scenario 9: While waiting for the bus, you notice a stray cat hiding under a nearby bench. It looks frightened and keeps meowing softly. What should you do?

Scenario 10: Cycling through your neighbourhood, you see a pack of stray dogs sleeping on the pavement ahead. They seem calm but are blocking your path. What's the safest way to proceed?

- B) Make loud noises to scare the dogs away.
- C) Dismount from your bike and calmly walk it past the sleeping dogs.
